# Piedmont gains 35-14 league win vs. Hayward

The Highlanders continued their winning ways on Friday, October 11 at Hayward High where they rolled over the Farmers 35-14. It marked Piedmont's first game in the Western Alameda County Conference's Mission Division since being promoted from the Shoreline.

"There was some buzz around this game. We moved up from the Shoreline and we're not sneaking up on anyone. I've been repeating that, we're not a secret now," coach Jordan Seiden said.

It was another big game for receiver Sam Shelby who had 96 receiving yards, 55 rushing yards, along with one touchdown reception and the game's final touchdown on a 38-yard carry. Tommy Ashton helped open things up with a huge 81-yard touchdown run Piedmont's first score.

Piedmont now looks ahead to perhaps its biggest game of the season against Irvington, another Mission Division opponent. The Vikings appear to be contenders in league this season with a 6-0 record. They won their first Mission Division game 26-15 over Washington, meaning PHS will likely need a win to earn the league banner.

## Game Recap

Piedmont held a narrow 7-0 lead at the end of the first quarter, but exploded for three touchdowns in the second quarter to go up 28-7 by halftime. Both teams went scoreless in the third with the Farmers inching back 28-14 early in the fourth, but the High-

landers added one more touchdown in the final going without allowing any points.

In the first quarter, running back Tommy Ashton scored Piedmont's first touchdown on an 81-yard carry, where he bounced outside to make his sprint down the sideline with 7:26 left. On Hayward's next drive, Brandon Dicke punched out a fumble and linebacker Cash Elmquist recovered at the 50, but PHS went three-and-out after.

Ashton also scored Piedmont's next drive with 8:54 left in the second quarter on the end of a long drive that stretched through the end of the first, making it 14-0. PHS then recovered a chipkick at the Hayward 36, leading to Elmquist scoring on a five-yard reception with 7:37 to go.

Hayward got on the board with 52.5 seconds left, but it was enough time for Piedmont. Starting off at their own 38, Piedmont drove to the house on five plays, capping off with a 15-yard fade to Shelby from Lagios with 6.7 seconds left. Piedmont led 28-7.

Both teams didn't score in the third quarter, but the Highlander's stopped a Farmers' drive to its own five yard line when hopping on a poorly handled snap. In the fourth, Hayward scored with 6:38 remaining to put itself within two possessions down 28-14.

But with 4:23 left, Shelby dashed their hopes of a comeback with a 38-yard carry on an end-around. On the play, Shelby found a hole through the middle of the offensive line and cut back to the left side once he hit the sec-

Piedmont High's girls' team continued its strong season, claiming the top spot in the 45th annual Clovis Invitational at Woodward Park in the small school division. With a score of 44, the Highlanders topped St. Mary's of Berkeley, Colfax, Marin Catholic, and Nipomo.

"The girls' team had a successful day, claiming first place as a team in the small school race. Despite a few of the girls being sick or not feeling well, they persevered and worked together as a team, running in a close pack and finishing strong," said coach Steve Zirkelbach.

Skylar Best, who was named the Post's' honorable mention for Athlete of Month in September, continued her strong pace. She led the way for Piedmont on the 5K course, clocking a time of 20:47.6 to finish fifth of 117 runners.

Trailing Best was sophomore Amalia Gray in seventh with a time of 21:06.5. Her time was a personal record by one minute, 41 seconds.

Rounding out Piedmont's top five runners was junior Cora Chun placing ninth in 21.28.4, sophomore Leighton Mand 11th in 21:34.5, and senior Carolina Taylor close behind in 12th,

Mand, notably, was dealing with a cold on race-day. We named her our Athlete of the Week last week.

"Leighton Mand was sick but was still able to pull through for an 11th place finish. She is a fierce competitor and not even a little sickness can keep her from finding a way to excel," Zirkelbach said.

### Boys' team

The. PHS boys' team finished 27th in the small-school blue division. Sophomore Sebastien Swain was the top runner for PHS, placing 74th of 200 runners in 16:57.9. Next in was junior Noah Sohn in 120th in 17:38, sophomore Thomas Ero placing 159th in 18:19.5, while Oliver Horsley rounded things out in 175th, 18:54.8.

"Sebastien Swain led the way and sophomore Noah Sohn also had a strong performance.

Thomas Ero and Alex Schleuning were not far behind as well," Zirkelbach said.

Piedmont has a busy week ahead with two meets in a few days. They'll run at Hayward High for its second Western Alameda County Conference meet of the season tomorrow, October 16, before returning to Hayward three days later on Saturday, October 19 for the 41st P. Wilder Mariner Invitational.
