Piedmont takes third in WACC Tournament

Linnane leads with 6 goals against Castro Valley

Piedmont's boys' water polo team finished third in the Western Alameda County Conference Championship Tournament after defeating Castro Valley 15-8 on Saturday, October 28 at Encinal, but losing two days earlier in a heated 10-9 overtime match with Berkeley.

"Winning league is nice, but our goal is to win NCS (North Coast Section). That's still in front of us. We played really tough and knew our league had some quality opponents this year. We're going into NCS feeling confident, I want to see how we respond," said first year head coach Rik Krumins.

The loss to Berkeley finished with controversy. Finn Burke drew a foul a few feet in front of net with four seconds left. However, the scorer's desk never stopped the clock when the foul was committed and the referees did not have their eyes on the clock. Before Piedmont could set up for a final play time on the clock had expired.

Head coach Rik Krumins and assistant coach John Savage instantly made their way to the scorer's desk to voice their grievance, but to no avail.

"They (the officials) have a really tough job and this was a great game. with two really evenly matched teams," said Krumins.

Piedmont's defeat means their run of three consecutive league titles is over. The goal for a Division 2 North Coast Section championship is still in front of them. PHS enters the NCS postseason with the No. 4 seed and a firstround bye.

15-8 over Castro Valley

Piedmont ended the first quarter with a 3-2 lead before getting out to a 9-5 advantage by halftime. Castro Valley drew closer 11-7 in the third quarter, but Piedmont added four goals and con-

ceded just one in the fourth.

After trailing 1-0, there were back-and-forth possessions before Piedmont's first score by Declan Linnane with a man-advantage at the 2:50 mark. Peter Krumins then scored two straight goals to go up 3-1 with 1:33 left, while CV scored on its next possession.

In the second period, Linnane scored four straight goals to put PHS up 7-2 before conceding the Trojans' next goal. Linnane added one more to make it 8-3 with 1:23 to go, while George Stein scored at the very last second to make it 9-5 going into halftime.

Burke scored 20 seconds into the third, 10-5, but CV scored two to draw closer 10-7 with 2:43 on the clock. Leo Hurwitz scored for Piedmont to make it 11-7 with 37 seconds left in the third. But PHS opened the fourth quarter with three straight goals by Burke, Elles Kreickhaus, and Stein to lead 14-7 with 4:17 to go. CV scored its last goal with 38 seconds left, while Elles Kreickhaus put the exclamation point on the game by scoring with nine seconds left.

Final stats: Linnane scored six goals, two assists, and steals. Stein scored two goals, two assists, one steal. Burke scored three goals, one steal. Kreickhaus had two goals and two steals. Krumins scored twice and had one assist. Luke McAuliffe had four saves, Gus von Metszch had two saves and three steals.

10-9 overtime loss to Berkeley

The semifinal first quarter ended in a 1-1 deadlock after Burke scored the game's initial goal 45 seconds in. Piedmont got out to a 3-1 lead in the second quarter with goals from Burke and Hurwitz, but the Yellowjackets eventually battled back to tie 3-3 with 3:27 left in the first half. McAuliffe had a big save with 1:05 left to keep it tied, while Hurwitz had a shot trail narrowly high with 48 seconds.

In the third, Berkeley gained the lead after 30 seconds but Daniel Banin scored on a breakaway to tie 4-4 with 5:29 on the clock. Berkeley then scored in close distance at 3:36 but Linnane scored on an assist from Hurwitz 20 seconds later, 5-5. Berkeley regained the lead at 3:03, but Krumins scored on a sidearm shot 30 seconds later, 6-6. Stein got Piedmont back out in front 7-6 at 1:23, but Berkeley tied on its next possession.

Piedmont had two chances to score to open the fourth with two shots by Banin ringing against the crossbar. Hurwitz then scored with a man-advantage at 5:03 left on an assist from Stein. Krumins had a shot tipped onto the post 45 seconds later, while Hurwitz had a shot blocked and Linnane had a shot trail wide. Those misses came back to haunt PHS with Berkeley tying the match at 2:51 and taking the lead at 2:08.

The Highlanders then drew another penalty, leading to Krumins scoring on an assist from Hurwitz with 1:33 left, 9-9, leading to overtime.

In the first of two three-minute overtime periods, both sides went scoreless through the first three minutes with both sides having multiple shots miss the target. McAuliffe recorded two saves through the period.

In the second, Berkeley scored after 25 seconds to gain the 10-9 lead, and then sat defensively. Krumins had a shot go wide at 1:42, while Piedmont gained a man-advantage with 1:05 left. Krumins had a shot clang against See Boys' Water Polo on page 28



Highlanders trample American, 52-30

With a football program revived after three years of questions about its survival, Piedmont is on the verge of capturing the Western Alameda County Conference's Shoreline Division title. By defeating American of Fremont 52-30 on Saturday, October 28, Piedmont Is 4-1 in league. A victory in its game this week with Newark Memorial would mark its first league title since winning the Shoreline Division in 2015.

Piedmont ended last week in a three-way tie for first place with Kennedy of Fremont and Newark Memorial. Newark, however, lost to Arroyo to push them down to fourth. Kennedy is also 4-1 in league, but PHS controls the tiebreaker after its win over the Titans on October 20. Kennedy will play lowly San Lorenzo, meaning the Highlanders need a win over Newark and the Shoreline is theirs.

It was a big offensive day for both Piedmont and the winless American Eagles with 82 total points. Piedmont led 25-0 before American's first points, as running back Tommy Ashton totaled 172 yards on 10 carries for two touchdowns.

Game Recap

After forcing American to punt, Piedmont scored in just four plays. On 3rd-and-10 from their own 37, Markos Lagios landed a 44-yard bomb to Shelby, followed

by Shelby taking a 19-yard run of tackle into the end zone—making it 6-0 after a missed extra point. PHS then forced another punt, where Shelby received at the right hash mark of Piedmont's 39, cutting to the left sideline to take it 61 yards to the house – 12-0 after a missed extra point. Piedmont forced another punt near the end of the first, leading to Tommy Ashton punching one across at the start of the second at the end of a 50-yard drive—18-0. PHS then forced a fumble recovered on American's next drive, leading to a seven-play series capped off with a 13-yard touchdown run by Lagios – making it 25-0 with an extra point.

American scored its first points on a 28-yard run on their next drive, while Shelby scored on a screen for 32-6, then Piedmont recovered a fumble on American's kickoff return at the Eagles' 38. After two plays, Piedmont scored on a 25-yard screen and run by Brandon Dicke, who switched the field on his reception on the right side, taking it across the field for the score -39-6. Ashton scored on the first play of the second half on a 55-yard run and a 46-6 lead.

American then scored on a 34-yard pass and got the 2-point conversion, following up with a recovered onside kick, eventually scoring on a short-pass – 46-20. Cash Elmquist scored on the following drive on a screen for a

PHS' defense forced a turnover on downs, followed by the offense scoring when Osman took a carry into the end zone for a 2-yard touchdown with 6:55 left in the game. him. The lady in blue was said to have been murdered by her betrayed fiancé while walking on the beach below the restaurant.

Redwood Road Preschool, Oakland Hills
