Highlanders finish fourth in season-ending tourney

Piedmont's flag football team, in its first season of scheduled games, fought to the end, but finished fourth in the Western Alameda County Conference Tournament in Hayward on Saturday, October 28. PHS opened with a nail-biting 13-12 loss to topseeded Berkeley, but fell 22-6 to the No. 3 seed, San Leandro, in the battle for third place.

"From the beginning of the season to the end, the girls had fun and enjoyed it. This season

was a win because of what we created, It was a win because we got better with every game," said PHS coach Beth Black.

Despite the score with the Pirates, it was a tight battle in both games. PHS had a touchdown controversially wiped out at the end of the first half.

In the previous round against Berkeley, the Highlanders rallied from a 13-0 deficit to make it 13-12 with 36 seconds left but fell short on its 1-point conversion. Piedmont's last drive started after Dahlia Osman nabbed an

interception for a takeaway in PHS' own end zone, leading to a 22-yard touchdown pass from Mia Leggett to Erinn Gardere down the sideline, recording an incredible contested catch in oneon-one coverage.

"The girls love to fight. We got so close in the end and wish we could've turned it around all the way," said Black.

PHS wraps up its first season of flag football as a varsity sport with a 4-6 overall record. They had the largest roster within the league by a considerable margin, showing how popular the sports can be even in a small-enrollment

The team was coached by Black, head of the high school English Department, defensive coordinator Hayley Adams, and Athletic Director Bradley Smet as offensive coordinator.

Alameda, the No. 2 seed, won the league title, beating Berkeley,

Semifinals vs. Berkeley

The first league semifinals were played on a 40-yard field and a clock wasn't available. Berkeley scored on a 4th-and-5 situation on a successful hook-and-ladder, where Jaima Harrison ran underneath the initial receiver on a short-pass—taking a pitch to the house for a 25-yard score. On the ensuing drive, Piedmont drove to the Berkeley 9-yard line, but a pass targeting Dorothy Nemeth was intercepted in the end zone. After the two sides traded possessions again, Berkeley scored on another hook-and-ladder, for a 13-0 lead.

In the second half, PHS's Lizzy Long recorded an intercepted on the Yellow Jackets first possession. The Highlanders scored on an eight-play series, featuring Nemeth converting a 4th-and-5 with a nine-yard reception, while Leggett landed a pass in traffic to Gardere. A failed 1-point conversion made

After back-and-forth possessions, Berkeley drove to Piedmont's 9-yard line, but Osman snatched an interception away from the Jackets' receiver in the back of the end zone, setting up a critical final drive for PHS with one minute to play.

The series started with passes to Nemeth, setting up 3rd-and-2 at the 22-yard line. That's Leggett threw a bomb down the sideline to Gardere, who leaped to reach out with one hand to trap it between her and the defender. She corralled the pass as she crossed the goal line making it 13-12 in the waning seconds.



On 4th-and-Goal from the 10 with just seven seconds left, Leggett hit Miya Fujimoto in the back corner of the end zone. However, officials didn't have eyes watching Fujimoto's feet and ruled her out of bounds after the far-side line-judge initially called her in. After a deliberation, referees said Fujimoto's other foot was out of bounds.

Piedmont opened the second half with a 12-play drive to the San Leandro 8-yard line, but the drive stopped on fourth down with an interception in the end zone after six minutes of action. PHS' defense forced a turnover on downs, followed by the offense scoring when Osman took a carry into the end zone for a 2-yard touchdown with 6:55 left in the game. However, PHS couldn't convert the 2-point conversion, 16-6.

San Leandro then scored the game's final touchdown with 33 seconds left, making it 22-6 after failing its 2-point conversion.
