HOMECOMING GAME

Piedmont falls 16-13 to Alameda in controversial finish

Piedmont High's football team suffered a devastating 16-13 loss on the road to Alameda on Saturday evening, October 7 at Thompson Field. Though it was Piedmont's Homecoming game, it was played in Alameda due to Piedmont's Witter Field being unplayable due to construction.

With Piedmont driving to the 1-yard line and the clock ticking down to the final seconds, on a 3rd-and-inches situation, the Highlanders called a dive play for running back Tommy Ashton. Although Ashton appeared to have stretched the ball several inches past the goal line, the referees called the Highlanders' running back short and the game

It marks the second straight game in which Piedmont was come out on the wrong end of an official's decisions. In a game with Arroyo on September 23, receiver Sam Shelby was

wrongly ejected in the second quarter by the same official who called Ashton short in Saturday's game. It's a situation that has left a sour taste for PHS coach Jordan

"The clock was going from to

2 to 1 and Markos handed the ball off to Tommy. You could see on film that Tommy's body is halfway across the goal line and our entire offensive line is in the end zone with the ball. According to them, we came up an inch short. Heartbreaker," said Seiden.

It leaves a dark cloud over what was a great game under the lights. The game was considered the Western Alameda County Conference's Shoreline Division championship game with Alameda undefeated at 5-0 and Piedmont was surging after three straight wins at 3-2.

"It was the heart of heartbreakers. It was awful, that one really hurt. It felt like a league title game, that's what the sentiment was. Never mind that they were undefeated, Alameda hadn't played with a deficit all season. We definitely felt like it was a game, while incredibly competitive, that we had a great chance to win," said Seiden.

After the first quarter with both teams deadlocked at 0-0, Alameda struck late in the second quarter on a drive capped by a 25-yard touchdown carry by the Hornets' running back.

Alameda was driving once again at the end of the second quarter, but Ashton intercepted a pass at the Piedmont 13-yard line with 13 seconds left in the half. Quarterback Markos Lagios threw a quick screen to Shelby, where the receiver made a move to inside before darting down the sideline speeding past defenders, typing the game at 7-7 at half-

The Highlanders surprised Alameda by taking the lead 13-7 in the third quarter on a long touchdown run by Lagios. The extra point was blocked. Alameda tied the game later in the third period 13-13, after they also missed their extra point attempt.

Piedmont had a chance to take the lead in the third quarter on a field goal, but Shelby's attempt was blocked. Alameda regained the lead midway through the fourth quarter on a field goal.

On the game's final possession, Piedmont drove down to within Alameda's five-yard line. With the clock showing 26 seconds left in the game, Seiden took See Football on page 32

PHS girls 3rd at Artichoke Invitational; boys 5th

Piedmont's cross-country team traveled to Half Moon Bay for the Artichoke Invitational on Saturday, October 7. The girls' team had a good day and placed third out of 11 teams. The boys' team was fifth in a field of 21teams. The races were designed for smaller enrollment schools at 2.3 miles.

It was the first race since the season-opener on September 9 at the Ed Sias Invitational. Poor air quality canceled their league meet on September 20.

"It had been a while since the team raced. The team was excited to test themselves again after several weeks of intense training,' said coach Steve Zirkelbach.

It was an impressive race for senior Xander Schulte Sasse with a fourth-place finish in a large field of 145 runners with a time

"Xander did his best to go out with the leaders and give them a run for their money, holding on strong, finishing in 4th place overall. He led the male harriers to 5th place as a team," said Zirkelbach.

On the girls' side, senior Jamie Schwarz led the way, placing eighth of 87 runners, with a time of 15:49. Sophomore Skylar Best was 15th in 16:15.

Freshman Leighton Mand made her varsity debut, impressing with a 16:47 to place 25th as Piedmont's third best runner. Rounding out Piedmont's top-

five was sophomore Cora Chun clocking a 16:55 and placing 27th, while junior Carolina Taylor placed 33rd in 17:20. Mand is joined by classmates Gladwin Horsley and Amalia Gray on the varsity roster.

"This team of girls is a very tight unit; they are very supportive of each other in practices and races, By staying so close to each other, they were able to achieve another podium finish," said Zirkelbach. "All of our freshman girls have been training hard and showing up in races with impressive focus.


