2nd consecutive blowout win for PHS in 41-3 drubbing of Encinal

Piedmont's football team is walking into its Western Alameda County Conference Shoreline Division schedule beaming with confidence after defeating upper Mission Division foe Encinal with a lopsided 41-3 win on Friday, September 15. It improves the Highlanders' record to 2-2. In the past two games they have outscored opponents 87-10 after dominating Mt. Eden 46-7 the previous week.

"It's a big win for the program and a step in the right direction," said coach Jordan Seiden. "We're trying to get this program back to where it has been, but we can't get a false sense of security. It was a win we felt like we could achieve. There will always be things we can fix."

Despite having a roster onehalf the size of the Jets, Piedmont kept high energy through all four quarters and never took their foot off of the gas. It was a testament to their conditioning in offseason and in practice.

"I'd hate to jinx us but we're approaching Week 4 and we haven't suffered a serious injury yet, just a couple of minor dings. It's a tribute to our conditioning in the offseason and how we push them in practice. We have a solid regimen throughout the week. They are starting to see why we have them running on weekends – to get the lactic acid out."

"I put my Masters in kinesiology to use sometimes," added Seiden with a laugh.

It was a terrific game for receiver, defensive back, and return specialist Sam Shelby, who recorded five receptions for 139 yards and two touchdowns, to go along with 48 rushing yards on two carries, and an interception.

One of the junior receiver's touchdowns was a 77-yard catch and run down the left side after breaking a tackle. Shelby could be nicknamed after the Shelby GT500, using his speed to sprint away from the Jets' defensive backs.

He credits his breakaway speed to what he learned under track coach Pouyan Assadi,

where he helped the 4x400 relay team qualify for the CIF State Championship.

"It's all thanks to track. I think it's completely changed my path in football. It's been such a big influence on my mentality towards the game and gives me that edge to help me break loose," said Shelby.

Senior running back Emmett Maxwell also had a big day, running for 97 yards on 13 carries, including a 28-yard touchdown after breaking two tackles. He also recorded a huge run against Mt. Eden where he carried multiple defenders to convert a first down.

"I just took a big breath before the snap and thought, 'this is it, I'm gonna do it right here.' I broke the first tackle and I saw the end zone. I couldn't believe what was happening... I just don't like to go down. I want to run the ball as far as I can possibly take it," said Maxwell.

PHS looks ahead to Arroyo in San Lorenzo this Saturday, September 23 for the start of their league schedule, with momentum on their side. The Dons are currently 1-3 with their only win against Encinal, 58-22...

Game Recap

Piedmont opened the game strongly with a 14-0 lead within five minutes. PHS recorded an onside kick attempt by Encinal and scored on a four-play series capped by a short touchdown run by quarterback Markos Lagios. Shelby picked off Encinal's opening pass, which eventually led to a touchdown reception by Cash Elmquist. The Highlanders then went up 21-0 with 2:35 left in the first quarter on a 20 yard carry by Tommy Ashton, who bulldozed a defensive back over the goal line.

In the second quarter, Encinal drove to Piedmont's 20, but Jordan Alemania forced a fumble on a 3rd down and Ashton recovered. On the ensuing series, Shelby scored on his mercurial 77-yard touchdown reception on a screen pass, breaking a tackle and speeding his way to the end zone, See Football on page 26

PHS tennis team beats St. Mary's, Head-Royce

Piedmont's tennis team finished a strong week with a pair of dominant wins over North Coast Section Division 2 opponents. They swept St. Mary's 7-0 at the Corey Reich Tennis Center in the Highlanders' home opener on Thursday, September 14, and defeated Head-Royce 5-2 in Oakland the following day.

"St. Mary's lost their toptwo players from last year and was a weaker team this year. We split the singles against Head-Royce but played great tennis all around," said PHS coach Jim Landes.

Making strong appearances in this year's singles lineup are sophomores Kate Jumper and Arianna Kortum, who paired together as freshmen in 2022.

"I'll always miss playing doubles with Arianna. We were the icon freshman duo last year and had a lot of fun together. But I really enjoy playing singles and hope to grow as a player," said Jumper.

"It's definitely different than playing with someone having your back out there. But neither of us have any regrets. We both are really enjoying playing singles," added Kortum.

Jumper won 6-1, 6-1 at the No. 1 spot against St. Mary's but lost 6-4, 6-2 at No. 2 versus Head-Royce.

"It's definitely different than playing doubles. You don't have a teammate to keep you disciplined on the court, so it becomes your job. It takes a lot of inner growth to switch from a doubles player to a singles player in a short amount of time," said Jumper.

Kortum, meanwhile, won 6-1, 6-4 at No. 3 versus St. Mary's and 6-4, 6-1 at No. 4 singles against Head-Royce.

"It's going well," said Kortum of her switch to singles. "It's definitely quite the change, especially since we were playing at a different level last year."

The Highlanders look ahead to a match today at Justin Sienna in Napa, September 20/ They host Castro Valley for their first Western Alameda County Conference match on Friday, September 22.

Piedmont's win was never in doubt with every match being won in straight sets. Abigail Call and Alina Shahid at No. 3 doubles were the first win of the day with a clean sweep, 6-0, 6-0. Carolina Romanczuk was the next win at No. 2 singles, 6-3, 6-0, followed by Samantha Huynh and Maddie Tran winning 6-1, 6-1 at No. 1 doubles.

Kortum reeled in the clinching fourth victory at No. 3 singles, 6-1, 6-4. Jumper then won handily 6-1, 6-1 at No. 1 singles, while Ellie Broscow won 6-1, 6-2 at No. 4 singles and Sophie LaForte and Inara Mehta won 6-0, 6-2 at No. 2 doubles.

The dirt path will take you toward another landmark, Cowell Ranch Beach, the most secluded of the beaches thus far. But past the beach, continuing on the Cowell-Purisima portion of the

Coastal Trail is a 3-mile stretch of untouched beachfront and nature preserves alongside coastline and farmlands. You won't spot a footprint in the sand.

The walk gives you a glimpse

of a marine preserve, Eel Rock, toward the Cowell-Purisima trail's end at the Seal Rock overlook.

The farmlands are currently lush with Brussels sprouts with another pumpkin field next to it. For bird watchers, the entire hike will be widespread with birds. You'll often spot red-tailed hawks, northern harriers, pelicans from the ocean, and if you're lucky enough-and barn owl or great horned owl. This writer was fortunate enough to spot one on a tree line of the Wavecrest Open Space portion of the trail.

For a shorter walk, you can cut off half the distance by parking at the Cowell Ranch Beach lot, which would bypass the Ritz golf course and Wavecrest Open Space, but be the most secluded and remote area of the coastal

It'd be wise to bring an extra layer given the marine layer of fog can quickly overtake the land.
