JV football team falls 16-12 to Skyline

Scots getting closer to breaking into win column

Piedmont's JV football team played a tight neck-and-neck game at Skyline High in Oakland on Friday, September 15. In spite of the loss, the score represented a marked improvement.

Ouarterback Cash Panico had a big day, helping lead the offense to an early touchdown on a quarterback sneak. During the Titans' ensuing drive, Skyline's center airmailed his snap over the quarterback allowing Piedmont to recover. However, the Highlanders didn't make the most of the turnover, and allowed Skyline to bounce back with a touchdown and two-point conversion go ahead 8-6. Both teams traded possessions in the remainder of the first half, and at halftime the score remained 8-6.

Piedmont opened the second half and looked like it was about to break the game open when freshman running back Rehan Mumtaz made an impressive 61-yard run for a touchdown. It was nullified due to a holding penalty, but despite the call, Panico helped get PHS back on the board with multiple scrambles and a pivotal pass to Marius Arno before tossing a 25-yard touchdown pass to running back Ryan Riddel, for a 12-8 lead.

In the fourth quarter, Piedmont's offense stalled and was forced to punt, and that's when disaster struck. On the punt attempt, PHS snapped the ball too high, allowing the Titans to block Riddel's kick and giving Skyline excellent field position.

With nine seconds left, Skyline ran down the middle for a touchdown and a 14-12 lead. On Skyline's two-point conversion, Panico at linebacker and Jason Shum at free safety met the Titans' quarterback near the goal line, but Skyline was awarded 2-point conversion.

Piedmont falls to Alameda in inaugural flag football opener

Thursday, September 14 marked a historic day for Piedmont High girls' sports with the flag football team playing its inaugural season-opening game. Although the Highlanders lost 13-0 to the Alameda Hornets at Thompson Field on the island, Piedmont walked out with heads held high knowing they just made school history as the first official flag football team to wear the Purple and White.

"It's an historic day. There were a lot of women and former Piedmont students who were in those stands thinking, 'I never got the chance to play.' These girls got to experience that today, and that's bigger than a win or a loss right now," said coach Beth Black.

"But now we want to win," she added.

It was back-and-forth action for both teams until Alameda broke the deadlock midway through the second half with 10:06 left in the game. Piedmont's offense came close to scoring on a couple of series, and its defense was solid until conceding two second half scores.

"It had the first-game feeling. We noticed in the WACC Jamboree that we got really hyped and then had to adjust. Today we came out similarly but adjusted quicker. I cannot say enough about our defense. There are things to correct, but they played a great game," said Black.

Defensive back Dahlia Osman had a big day, making two interceptions and being among the leading tacklers. One of her interceptions was a takeaway in Piedmont's end zone to prevent a Hornets' touchdown.

"When the quarterback throws long, it tends to give me time to adjust and get in front of who I'm defending, and I just caught it. The second one was similar. I had time to see where it was going, so I jumped off of my original player to get it," said Osman.

Offensively, Miya Fujimoto made her presence felt with her speed out of the receiver position, often out running defenders to the wings. She's a two-sport athlete with softball in the spring and was named the Post's' Freshman of the Year last year.

"Miya is a weapon. It was nice to see her have some big runs. She's running hard and putting it all out there," said Black.

The Highlanders are scheduled to play Mt. Eden in Hayward tomorrow, Thursday, September 21 for another Western Alameda County Conference match.

Game Recap

After forcing Alameda to turnover on downs in the game's first possession, PHS retained at its own 25-yard line on the 80-yard field, but tossed an interception on their second play to put the Hornets at Piedmont's 10 yard line. On first down, Alameda attempted a pass to the end zone, but Osman nabbed an interception.

Piedmont drove to the AHS 35-yard line, but the Hornets picked off another pass. Alameda then drove down to PHS' one-yard line, but failed on 4th-and-1 with an incomplete pass with 1:29 left in the first half. Teams, notably, cannot call run-plays on

After Osman intercepted another pass with 15 seconds left in the half at their own 35, quarterback Friedie Schickendanz connected with Dorothy Nemeth, who broke past a group of defenders to run to the Alameda 5-yard line as time expired.

The dirt path will take you toward another landmark, Cowell Ranch Beach, the most secluded of the beaches thus far. But past the beach, continuing on the Cowell-Purisima portion of the

Coastal Trail is a 3-mile stretch of untouched beachfront and nature preserves alongside coastline and farmlands. You won't spot a footprint in the sand.

The walk gives you a glimpse

of a marine preserve, Eel Rock, toward the Cowell-Purisima trail's end at the Seal Rock overlook.

The farmlands are currently lush with Brussels sprouts with another pumpkin field next to it. For bird watchers, the entire hike will be widespread with birds. You'll often spot red-tailed hawks, northern harriers, pelicans from the ocean, and if you're lucky enough-and barn owl or great horned owl. This writer was fortunate enough to spot one on a tree line of the Wavecrest Open Space portion of the trail.

For a shorter walk, you can cut off half the distance by parking at the Cowell Ranch Beach lot, which would bypass the Ritz golf course and Wavecrest Open Space, but be the most secluded and remote area of the coastal

It'd be wise to bring an extra layer given the marine layer of fog can quickly overtake the land.
