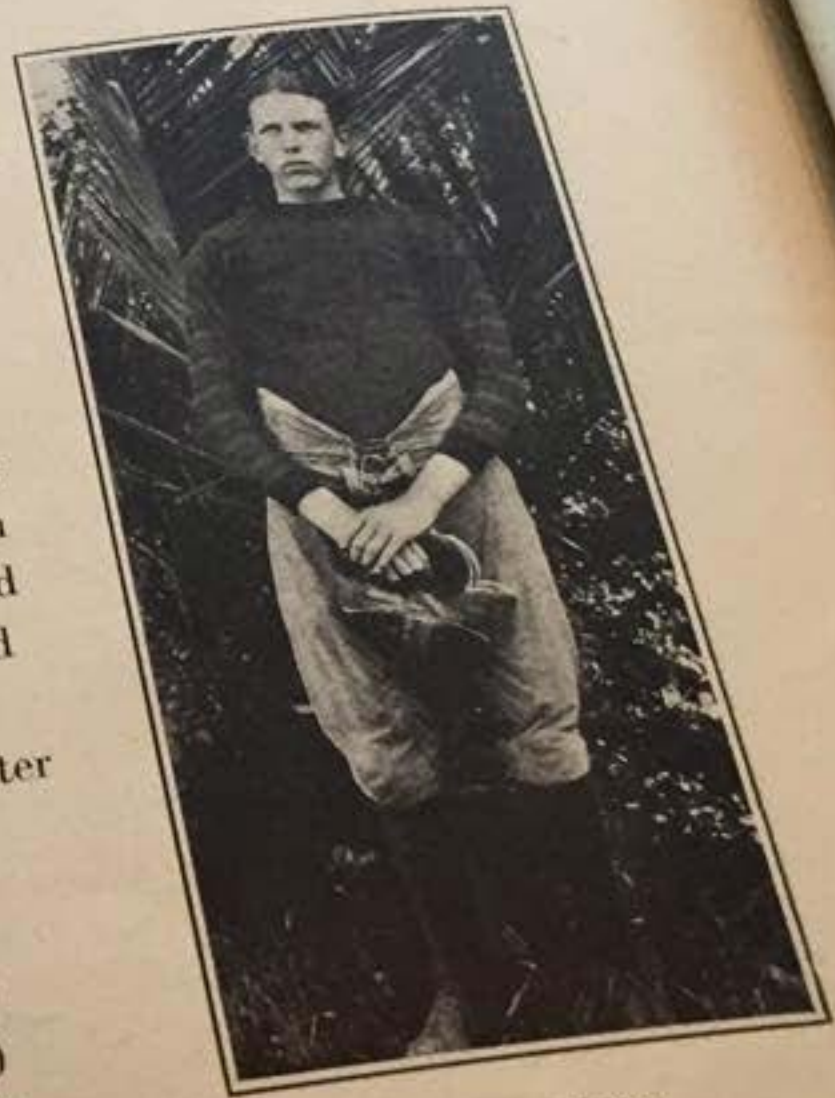
SPORTS
