
A Piedmont player slips away from a pursuing opponent



Keith Bryan sets up and releases a punt




Tim Smith receives a pirch and runs wide for a 7 yard gain.



Stuart Taylor drops back to pass over the offensive line.



Frosh Capture League Championship




Coach Mike Humphries discusses game plan or half-time in the contest here with Terra Linda.

For two years in a row, in 1977 and 1978, Piedmont's freshman football ream had shown their supremacy in the A.C.A.L. Let the 1979 Frosh ream be no exception! 
