




PASS, PLAY, WIN

Scots win league title







or the first in five years, the football team, with an overall record of 8-3, made it to the NCS 2A playoffs. However, the Scots lost their bid for the NCS 2A Championship when they were defeated by San Lorenzo 14-28 on Nov. 20. It was a hard-fought game, much closer than the final score indicated.

Compared to past years, the team was relatively injury-free. Nat Dodge became a spectator for the first three games due to a knee injury, and Eric Voulgares joined him for the last game when he suffered a thigh bruise which developed into torn ligaments.

The Scots compiled an impressive 5-1 league record. Their first game against Alameda was the only one they lost, 7-14. The second game was against Encinal, which Piedmont won 22-7. Sandy Schwab completed 7 or 8 passes for 105 yards, Tom Pierce rushed for 100 yards on 8 carries and two touchdowns, and Mike O'Shea ran for 97 yards on 15 carries.


The Scots disposed of Pacific 20-10 before meeting San Leandro in the Homecoming game. Keith Bryan's field goal in the second quarter gave the Scots a 3-0 win. In the last league game, Harry Ells was demolished 34-0, with Piedmont racking up a total of 22 first downs.

The success of the Varsity team was based on outstanding performances by many players, including quarterback Sandy Schwab, who won the League passing title and was named ACAL Player of the Year. Charlie Camporeale finished first in the league for receptions and yardage, with Cory Anderson a close second. Mike O'Shea captured the league rushing title. Other All-League honors went to Seamus Meagher, Jeff Rinehart, and Eric Voulgares. All-East Bay Second Team titles went to Camporeale for receiving and Meagher for Offensive Tackle.

espite a 2-9 record, the Junior Varsity Football team came through with some achievements attained by leading players including Peter Hoefs, Mike Briz, and Ross Thurling.


The offense passed for more than 1000 yards and six touchdowns. Over half the yardage was received by Peter Hoefs, who made 4 of the 6 touchdowns. Other top receivers included Greg Woehrle, with over 10 yards per reception, and Drew Herzoff, with a total of 83 yards. In the rushing department the running backs gained over 200 yards and 3 touchdowns. Mike Briz, who averaged over four yards per carry, ran for a total of 94. Steve Chan, also a top player, scored 2 of the 3 touchdowns.

Defensively, the team had a total of 14 interceptions, 6 or them by Ross Thurling. Other interceptors included Mark Lee, Dan Marcus, and Mike Briz. Derek Toti, who assumed punting duties mid-season, helped immensely in the special team which forced the opposition to play deeper in their own territory.


VICTORIOUS EFFORTS

Quarterback Jim Stehr and rusher Andy Carstens shared the spotlight. Stehr passed for over 1000 yards, and Carstens totaled a 324 yard record and scored more than 40 points. Outstanding receiver Steve Humphries held up his end of the offense's reputation by finishing the season with over 300 yards run. Ed Purcell, also a receiver, averaged an amazing 22 yards per catch.

The productive bond that drove the offense ahead formed the defensive line into a living barricade which held its opposition to only a few points. Quick on his feet Joel Nelson stymied the opposing teams' offenses with his season sum of 60 tackles.







