

IN THE LINE OF DUTY

Injuries hurt Varsity's hopes

BECAUSE

of some bad breaks and some major injuries, the Varsity Football team ended the season with a 3-3 record in league play and an overall record of 3-6. The injury list included starting players Lee Mahoney, Joel Nelson, Mike O'Shea, Mike Parachini, and Ross Thurling.

The Scots' final record of 3-6 does not reflect the hard work that went into this season. With almost half the team underclassmen, new head coach John Lupoi had his work cut out for him. But he accepted the challenge and molded the players into a solid squad.

Despite the ankle injury of O'Shea in the San Leandro game, leading rusher Tom Pierce held up the ground attack by running 56 for 232 yards for the season. Bryan Schwartz, leading quarterback in the league, threw 133 passes for 1,680 yards, aiding the offensive drive. Charlie Camporeale, first in the league last year for receptions and yardage, caught 46 passes for 686 yards and had 8 touchdowns this season.

Defensively, the Scots had over 545 tackles and a total of 7 interceptions. Leading tackler Matt Heron had a total of 76 tackles on the season.

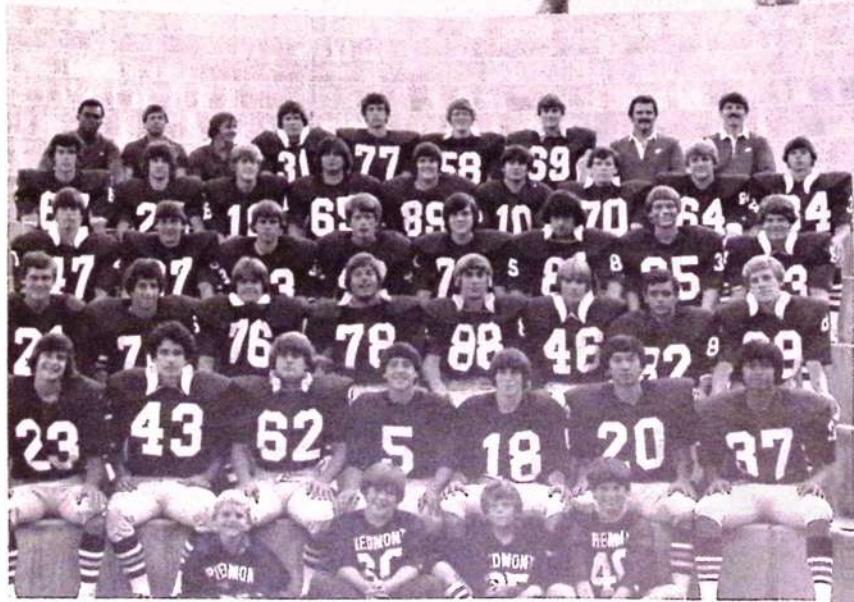

IN SPITE

of a 2-7 record the Junior Varsity Football team produced some very promising players for the future: Andy Carstens, Dean Robb, Tim Smith, and Brian Stahl, to mention just a few.

The offensive attack was led on the ground by Carstens and Robb, who dominated the rushing department. Carstens, who carried 46 for 245 yards, averaged over 5.3 yards per carry and scored 2 touchdowns. Robb carried for over 235 yards and attained an average of 5.2 yards per carry. Tight-end Tim Smith and wide receiver Brian Stahl aided the Scots' efforts. Smith was 11 for 166 yards in receptions and averaged over 15.1 yards per reception. Following close behind was Stahl, with over 125 yards in receptions.

Defensively, the Scots had over 550 tackles and a total of 9 interceptions. Leading tackler Dean Robb had a total of 55 tackles overall. Other top defensive players included Andy Carstens, Matt Cohen, Larry Toothman, and Alex Werts.

Overall, it was a great season for the Junior Varsity. The team had a lot of talent and guts, which should provide next year's Varsity with a strong squad under Coach John Lupoi.

ONCE

again the Freshman Football team captured the ACAL championship. Finishing undefeated, with an overall 7-0 record, the Scots completely dominated their opponents. Coach Mike Humphries created a force that proved to be unstoppable.

Quarterback Todd Crist, rusher Jim Gallagher, and receiver Mark McGrath were strong contributors to the offensive force. Crist passed for over 520 yards, and Gallagher totaled over 550 yards rushing. McGrath, an outstanding receiver, held up his end of the offensive air attack by catching 28 passes for a total of 305 yards, an average of 10.9 yards per reception.

The same force that drove the offense to success also united the defense into a wall that held its opponents to limited action. Tom McHugh and Jim Gallagher led in a close race for overall tackles, with a combined average of 52 tackles per player.

Playing freshman football under Coach Mike Humphries, the Frosh have always been pressured to continue the tradition of winning the ACAL Championship. Although many people felt that this year's team did not have the potential of past teams, the 1982 Frosh did carry on the winning tradition.
