
supplied by quarterback Mike Adams. The defense was a team effort with all eleven players flying to the ball every play.

The 1996 Piedmont Highlanders (right) hold up their helmets for the national anthem. This pre-game tradition always got the players juiced.


Senior Andrew Koch (below) jogs back to the sidelines after clutching a much needed reception. Koch's skills as a receiver were vital to the team.












