




The Highlanders (above) charge onto their home field before their game while the announcer read their names over the loudspeaker.




Coach Russ Robb turned these boys into meneven before their grueling season, since they haddouble-day intense practices. Many










After gaining a first down, sophomore Trent Miller (#36 above) is tackled just past the twenty yard line by the rival team, Tennyson.

Sophomore Chris Swenson (#26above) sprints down the field with the help of excellent blockers leading the team closer to the endzone.




