Piedmont punches ticket to first NCS Championship game since 1976

Piedmont High's No. 2 seeded football team made school history on Friday, November 21. It is the second team in school history to qualify for the North Coast Section Championship game after beating No. 3 Willits 28-10 in the NCS semifinals at Witter Field. They are now set to square off in the Division 7 title game against No. 1 Middletown this Friday, November 28 at Justin Siena High School in Napa.

The 1976 NCS title-winning Hall of Fame squad and this year's team are the only Championship game appearances in Piedmont High's 100-plus year history.

"I was just three years old. I've said before, not a lot of people thought we'd be here. The guys stuck with it through my ranting and raving. They never wanted to quit and they never lay down," said Piedmont head coach Jordan Seiden.

It's a miraculous moment for the football program, considering it lost eight seniors from last year's team and fell in the Dov. 8 NCS semifinals on Ferndale's swampy playing surface.

This is the first time Piedmont has reached the semifinals in two consecutive years. It has appeared in the semifinals in 1976, 1981, 2014, 2016, 2024, and now 2025.

"We're in the history books. It's amazing; we couldn't get it done last year. We had the talent, but had to play in tough field conditions,:" said running back and linebacker Xavier Henderson.

"I don't even know what to say; so many words come to mind. We're making history and hopefully we can get that win to make history next Friday," added quarterback Jimmy Lagios.

Piedmont had to lean on its defense to keep Willits out of the end zone. The Highland-

ers didn't score the game's first touchdown until 3:43 remained in the first quarter, and the Wolverines stayed just one possession back of the lead through three quarters of the game. But once PHS figured out Willits' rushing attack, Ferndale struggled to finish drives.

"To start the game, they were chipping off small plays, and their big drive came from some big plays. We knew if we did our jobs, we'd be fine. Once our offense started going, it forced them to pass. Our coverage is really good, and their throws were all screens, so we just had to

focus on tackling," middle line-backer Colby Hong said.

Henderson, the team's star running back, made his presence felt on defense as a linebacker. On offense he led the team with three rushing touchdowns.

"I give all credit to my offensive line, as always. I couldn't do anything without them," Henderson said. "Defensively, I haven't played in a few weeks because of a concussion. I had to step up and play for the team. There's a lot to correct still, but that's football; we live to fight another day."

Game Recap

After trading possessions to start the game, Piedmont struck first with 3:34 remaining in the first quarter when Rehan Mumtaz punched across a two-yard carry. The previous play, Henderson broke a tackle to take a carry 26 yards to the two.

Willits answered on its next possession, scoring on a 12-play series at the 10:56 mark of the second quarter, which capped off with a 31-yard touchdown carry on a 4th-and-4 situation. PHS wound up punting on its next possession, but thwarted Willits on 4th-and-1 at the Highlanders' 16, where linebacker George Saunders burst through the line to stop a fullback carry.

PHS then scored on a nineplay series with 32 seconds left in the half. The drive featured a 23 yard carry my Mumtaz, a 47-yard reception by Diego Hurwitz down to the three, and capped by a touchdown by Henderson.

In the third quarter, more back-and-forth possessions led to a 34-yard field goal by Willits with 2:20 left, cutting Piedmont's lead to 14-10. But PHS' offense came alive with two touchdowns in the fourth quarter.

The Highlanders scored on its next possession, taking it 64 yards on eight plays, finishing with a two-yard score by Henderson with 10:39 left. During the series, PHS had chunk plays of 16 and 15 yards by Henderson, and 18 and 12-yard receptions by Cash Panico.

Piedmont then forced another turnover on downs at Willits' 45 with 6:25 left, leading to a 12-play touchdown series with 1:44 remaining in the game. Jack Meyjes had a 12 yard reception, Henderson had a 14-yard run where he stiff-armed a defender to the floor, while Henderson scored on a six-yard carry.

Final game stats were not provided.


